Many thanks to Stephen West, Brenton Eckert, Michelle Rozee and Sina Panic for their involvement with their respective committees over the past few years.

At the Board meeting in Perth and subsequently the annual general meeting a motion was passed to increase membership fees for the Society effective 2006. As of 2006 membership fees for all members will double, with an adjustment for CPI every three years after that. Some members may feel that this increase is not justified, if this is the case please speak to your regional representative as consideration will be given to students and members with genuine hardships.

The reasons for these increases are multi-factorial and include:

1. Costs for the Society have increased, and will continue to increase as our profile increases.
2. For the Society to continue to offer travel, educational and research grants it is critical to ensure that our reserves are not progressively decreased due to the increasing operating costs of the Society.

One of the most important items discussed at the Board meeting and the AGM was the Society's Vision and Mission statements. The previous Executive have already thanked Brigitte Borg and Kevin Gain for their considerable work in the development of the Society Vision and to David Robiony-Rogers for his insightful input and the current Executive would like to echo those thanks. At the Perth ASM the Board voted to adopt the following Vision statement, with unanimous support at the AGM

Australian and New Zealand Society of Respiratory Science
Leading Respiratory Science in Australasia through the 21st
Century.

This is the Society Vision that the Executive and Board will use over the course of the next term to move the Society forward.

One thing that was clear from the Board meeting in Perth is that we all have lots of enthusiasm for the Society and Board members enthusiastic about taking the development of the Society in the short and medium term. Hopefully having people talk about what they did with their own laboratory accreditation or what an assessor expected may assist others with their preparation. I know this is something that a sub-group of the ANZSRS board are looking into.

The clinical presentation was 'Inspiratory muscle and whole-body exercise training in COPD', presented by Kylie Hill: PhD Candidate; Dept's Physiotherapy (Curtin University) & Pulmonary Physiology (SCGH). - These awards were announced at the recent ASM's and are in recognition of Kevin's contributions to both Societies. Robert Tagliaferri presented the awards. Congrats to Kevin!

ANZSRS ASM: There was agreement by those who had attended the ASM that this was a successful conference. Several new initiatives were tried e.g. special interest workshops and although there were a few 'hitches' in some areas, these experiences can be used to build on for future ASM's. The LOC were congratulated on their hard work in both organising the ASM and the way in which they handled unexpected dilemmas, problems, & challenges that arose throughout the conference period. We are already looking forward to and planning for the 2006 Canberra meeting.

CRFS: At the February meeting it was agreed to leave the organising of the CRFS/Ongoing Ed workshop initiative until after the ASM. Now the time has come to get stuck into our ongoing ed asap! Kevin Gain volunteered (or was volunteered - everyone seemed to be looking in his direction at the time) to be

the coordinator of the workshops. Local members can expect to hear from Kevin shortly.

TSANZ-WA Associates: Sally Young is currently on the TSANZ-WA Associates planning committee, as the ANZSRS-WA rep. There is much interest in involving the local ANZSRS members in the annual TSANZ-WA Associates meeting. This scientific meeting provides an excellent opportunity for the local clinicians, researchers, and respiratory scientists to come together and is highly regarded nationally. This year's meeting will be held on the weekend of October 22 & 23 in Mandurah and the theme for the meeting is 'Breathing Under Extreme Conditions'. Perth QA Program: After a hiatus, Kevin Gain advised that this program would restart shortly. The initial aim is to get the program up and running again on a regular basis and then look at working on the additional features, such as a web based database. Given the emphasis on the importance of inter-institution quality assurance, at the recent ASM, the WA membership were very keen and supportive to have this program on the go again. The program currently includes respiratory departments at Sir Charles Gairdner, Royal Perth, Princess Margaret Hospital and The Mount Hospital and is coordinated by Rob Tagliaferri, Graham Hall, and Kevin Gain. Welcome to Fremantle Hospital as a new member of the QA program. Bill Smith, Fremantle Hospital, raised the equally important issue of standardisation of predicted values between labs. This issue of predicted values was another key issue raised throughout the recent ASM - so more food for thought!

ACOSH Representation: Sina Panic (SCGH) has been representing ANZSRS-WA on the Australian Council of Smoking & Health for several years now, a position previously held by Sharon Lagan (SCGH). Due to other commitments, Sina will be resigning from this position. Sina gave the meeting an overview of: the activity of ACOSH, the frequency of meeting attendance, and what is required of being a representative. The meeting agreed that this was an important organisation to be involved with and wished to continue having a representative at ACOSH.
