Special ANZSRS-WA Meeting

Professor Janet Stocks is in town and we are very pleased to be able to announce that she has kindly agreed to present to ANZSRS-WA on Monday 10th April, 5pm. Janet Stocks is the Professor of Respiratory Physiology at the University College London, Institute of Child Health and Great Ormond St Hospital for Children in London. Her laboratory has one of the widest ranges of infant and pre-school lung function tests available worldwide. She has published widely on the development and validation of tests for assessing lung function in this age group, including international (ATS/ERS) initiatives. Professor Stocks is currently developing international growth charts for lung

function with which to distinguish the effects of disease from those of growth and development in preschool children.

Professor Stocks will be presenting on: 'Does normal spirometry reflect normal lung function?
New insights into small airway disease.'

Aridol Challenge Information Session

This will be a combined information and hands-on promotional session, sponsored by Pharmaxis, for those interested in a new product for the assessment of airway responsiveness. This session will also include a brief presentation by ANZSRS-WA on the role of challenge testing in asthma, focusing on advantages and disadvantages of each type of test.
