New Arrivals

In the Deep South the staff in the Invercargill lab are getting ready to welcome a new addition to the lab as they take delivery of a new Vmax Encore system. The lab down there are excited to be getting a modern system to replace the “ancient” system they are currently using.

Sporting achievements

The NZ branch has maintained our active sporting achievements with 2 of our Christchurch members taking part in the Christchurch City2suf. Josh Stanton and Chris O’Dea lined up on a typically wonderful Christchurch morning without a breath of wind or cloud in the sky to complete the 12km course along the Avon River. Both were very pleased with their run in the warm Christchurch conditions, with Chris taking out the ANZSRS line honours in a time of 54mins 7secs just edging out Josh with a time of 57 minutes.

Renovations

The Dunedin Hospital Respiratory Laboratory is currently undergoing a make over. The room configuration of the old lab was a simple 3 roomed area; patient waiting area, utility room and open plan lab area with 2 physiologists and 2 patients at the same time. The newly refurbished configuration of the area will have a patient waiting area, a reception area, a utility/store room, a spirometry/challenge room, a body plethysmograph room and an arterial blood gas room. Chris McLachlan would have been very pleased to see the new lab as it was an issue she felt very strongly about and fought hard to get into motion.

Lab Profile

This month’s exciting lab profile is coming from our major city with the Greelane/Auckland city laboratory. Thanks to Kevin Ellyett who provided us with the following insight:

The laboratory is split into 2 facilities with an outpatient facility located at the Greenlane Clinical Centre and an inpatient facility located in the Auckland City Hospital. Currently we have 1 Charge Physiologist, 3 Respiratory Physiologists and 2 trainee Respiratory Physiologists.

We operate Sensormedics V6200 Autobox and a Sensormedics VMax Encore Exercise system with cycle ergometer and treadmill at the

Greenlane site. We have a Sensormedics 6200 Autobox on our Auckland City Hospital site.

For our inpatient testing we offer Spirometry, Plethysmography, Single-Breath Diffusing Capacity, Bronchodilator Response, Maximum Expiratory and Inspiratory Pressures.

At the Greenlane Clinic we offer Spirometry, Plethysmography, Single-Breath Diffusing Capacity, Bronchodilator Response, Bronchoprovocation Testing (using Histamine, Saline, Exercise and Cold-Air), Progressive Exercise Test, Forced Oscillometry, Lung Volumes by Nitrogen Washout, Expired Nitric Oxide Analysis, Closing Volumes (Single Breath Oxygen Test), Arterial Blood Gas Analysis, Pulmonary Compliance Measurement, Maximum Expiratory and Inspiratory Pressure, Shunt Determination, Hypoxic Challenge (Fitness to Fly) and Autonomic Response (ANS) Evaluation.

Thanks to Kevin for giving us an insight into the Auckland City/Greenlane lab.

Just a reminder to the NZ branch members to ensure they have packed the tropical gear for our Darwin getaway, and I hope to share a few drinks with you all, maybe even a cocktail out of a coconut with the little umbrella.
