Western Australia

WA held its first Clinical Branch meeting for 2009 in February at Royal Perth Hospital.

We would like to say thank you to Dr. Jeanie Leong for an interesting presentation on Allergic Bronchopulmonary Aspergillosis (ABPA).

ABPA Summary

- ABPA can complicate Asthma and Cystic Fibrosis (CF).
- Starts with inhalation of Aspergillus spores.
- Tends to colonise abnormal airways. Complex hypersensitivity reaction can occur when airways are colonised.
- Symptoms: fever, brown sputum, eosinophilia, radiological changes (pulmonary infiltrates, central bronchiectasis, pseudo tumours), collapse of lobe, spontaneous pneumothorax
- Treatment: Prednisolone is most useful either on its own or in conjunction with the antifungal itraconazole
- Progression between stages, remission and reoccurrences are not well understood.

Interlaboratory Quality Assurance Programme (QAP)

Elise Chu from RPH presented the results for January after breathing new life into our External QAP. She has arranged for three testing sessions per year one in January, May, and September. Ten teaching and private labs have agreed to participate in the programme, meaning there will be a gruelling 10 tests over a two week period for the QA subjects. Something to look forward to. Overall there was amazingly good agreement between labs but a couple of problems were identified underlining the importance of doing this work.
